ur NJ State Army of Hope Committee has been very busy doing what we do best: taking care of our severely wounded veterans and their families, as well as the families of our fallen.

Within the last 3 months we have provided approximately \$43,600 to assist these families with rent, mortgage payments, HVAC units and utilities. We also disbursed an additional \$38,000 in back-to-school checks for the children heading back to school.

On August 4th, we held our annual golf outing at Fox Hollow Country Club. We had 91 golfers and netted a profit of \$11,800. What a wonderful way to further our cause.

Sunday, September 10th, we had our 19th Annual Army of Hope Picnic "A Day of Remembrance & Patriotism" at Lacey Lodge. With a very wet start Sunday morning, we still managed to have a fantastic and emotionally moving day for our families.

As of Monday morning, we had raised \$192,443.50 and funds were still coming in! This was, without a doubt, our best picnic yet.

# New Jersey Welcomes Grand Exalted Ruler Randy P. Shook and First Lady Wanda


ashville, Tennessee is the birthplace of country music, bluegrass, and Randy Paul Shook who was born in its rolling hills on the 25th of November. Completing school in 1974, Randy worked in the family farming operation until 1977 when he joined the team at Genesco, a shoe manufacturer in nearby Pulaski. His career advanced while at Genesco, as he was promoted to Assistant Department Manager in 1980 and Department Manager in 1982. Randy's time at Genesco is significant for another reason: in 1981, this is where he met the love of his life and his soulmate, Wanda. They have been partners in life, love, and laughter ever since.

In 1984, Randy discovered his vocation while studying Real Estate, Banking, and Economics at Columbia State Community College and became an affiliate real estate broker. After continuing to take courses through the Tennessee Real Estate Educational System and graduating from the Nashville Auction School, Randy became a licensed Real Estate Broker and Auctioneer in 1986. He served as President of the Southern Middle Tennessee Board of Realtors in 1989.

Randy was proposed and initiated into Lawrenceburg Lodge No. 2206 in 1993 and continues to this day to be an active and dedicated member serving as Exalted ruler in 1996-1997. Randy was named Lawrenceburg Elk of the Year in 2008-2009

Randy began his service to the Tennessee Elks Association in 1998-1999 as Vice President-Elect and 1999-2000 as Vice President. He was elected President-Elect in 2004-2005 and served as Tennessee State President in 2005-2006. He was named Tennessee Elk of the Year in 2007-2008 and was inducted into the Tennessee Elks Hall of Fame in 2012-2013.

At the Grand Lodge level, Randy was appointed Esquire to District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler in 2000-2001 and in 2001-2002, served as District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler for the Middle District of Tennessee. Randy was named Area 3 Grand Lodge Government Relations member from 2007 through 2009. He was elected Grand Treasurer for 2009-2010. Randy was named Area 3 Public Relations and Marketing Member from 2014 to 2018. In 2018, he was elected to represent Area 3 on the Board of Grand Trustees, serving as Building Applications–West Member in 2018-2019; Pensions and Benefits Member in 2019-2020; Secretary of the Board in 2020-2021; and Chairman of the Board in 2021-2022.



Randy and Wanda were married on March 19, 1982, and together they have two sons: Brad and Billy. When Brad was 21 years old, Randy had the honor of initiating him into the Elks. When Billy was 21, Randy was the District Deputy of Tennessee's Middle District and was present as Billy was initiated into the Order. Tragically, Brad died in 2021 after a brave fight against pancreatic cancer. Randy and Wanda continue to reside in Lawrence County, Tennessee where they are surrounded by extended family, friends, and most importantly, their four wonderful grandchildren: Madison, Jacob, Griffin, and Vaida.

Randy and Wanda are looking forward to the adventures ahead and are thankful and humbled to represent the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the United States of America as Grand Exalted Ruler and First Lady. We welcome the opportunity to meet new friends and let our communities know that: WE ARE...THE ELKS!

# Requirements for Seeking Elective Office in This Association

Article VI Section 3D – Elections (District Vice President & Trustee)

Section 3: Any Member of this Association may seek an elective office in the Association provided:

(A) They are a Member in good standing in their Lodge and a Past Exalted Ruler

(B) Their Lodge is a Member Lodge in good standing in this Association and is located in a District in the electing Region or the District is eligible for the office sought.

(C) For the position of Vice-President and Trustee, they shall have filed by certified mail, return receipt requested or by email, with the President, their District's Vice President and the Secretary of this Association, not before December 1 and no later than January 5th, a Resolution of endorsement adopted by their Lodge, at a regular Lodge session. Said resolution must be signed by the Lodge Exalted Ruler and certified by the Lodge Secretary. If they elect to file by sending an email, it shall only be effective upon receipt of a return email from the President, Secretary and/ or Vice President, acknowledging receipt of the Resolution. A local Lodge may only endorse one candidate for the position of Vice President or Trustee.

The Districts which will have Trustee Elections in 2024 are: Central, East Central, North Central, and South East.

he goal of the Lodge Activities Committee is to foster lodge participation in both Member & Community Services.

The Lodge Activities contests encourage the annual recording of these services and provides a historical record of each lodge's efforts.

During the 2022-23 year we introduced newly updated and revised contest materials for our three NJSEA Lodge Activity Contests - the Lodge Bulletin, the Memorial Service and the Community Service and Image Contests. These include updated and revised Contest Description Sheets and Contest Judging Forms. They now provide invaluable tools and guidelines for both our lodges as well as our judges. 
# **Americanism Committee**

# NJSEA GIVERS OF HOPE

ovember is National Veterans Remembrance Month. In New Jersey, every month is National Veterans Remembrance month. A key component of the National Veterans Service Committee is the Homeless Veterans Program. This program started in 2017. Last year, the Grand Lodge National Veterans Service Commission sent a film crew to New Jersey to put together a video about our program. At that time, we were given the name, "Givers of Hope". This video was shown at the Sunday opening of the Grand Lodge Session in Minneapolis.

In December of 2022 the NJ State Elks helped their 2000th veteran. To date we have just surpassed 2200. The NJSEA Veteran's Committee raises money to be used to help veterans who are homeless, to prevent homelessness and assist at need Veterans. The committee lives out the creed: As long as there are Veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them.

Our lodges help veterans who were homeless and moving into new housing by providing a "Welcome Home Kit". The lodges both fundraise and use Beacon and Gratitude ENF grants to purchase needed items for the kit. The kit has over 30 different household items which are needed when moving into a new housing such as dishes, bath towels, sheets, bed in a bag, pots, knife sets, cleaning supplies and non-perishable food. The committee also provides brand new furniture to the veteran (bed, couch, end table, coffee table, table with chairs, dresser, night stand, lamps, microwave and air conditioner when needed). The value of all items given to the veteran is approximately \$2000. Elk volunteers load the trucks and deliver and setup the furniture.

The Veterans Committee also helps prevent homelessness by assisting with rent or mortgage payments, paying electric, water and gas bills. Assistance is also provided in the way of hotel rooms while veterans are waiting for housing. They have helped with car repairs and storage unit bills so veterans would not lose their belongings as well as provide food and clothes to veterans in need.

To assist the members of our District Veteran's Committee, there are storage units located throughout the state. There are two units at Marlton Lodge, one 40-foot unit at Old Bridge Lodge, two 20-foot units at Brick Lodge and a storage shed at Lacey Lodge. The committee's main building is in Stirling. The NJSEA Veteran's committee receives all donated items at the Stirling facility and then sends them out to the other units.



he National Veterans Service Commission has grown by leaps and bounds, and we are just so proud! Just a few short years ago this state committee helped a few Veterans in need, but the emphasis was providing commissary and incidental needs of those housed in state and VA homes. We have taken on a new role over the last few years and have grown into a National award-winning committee with help coming from most of our lodges either through donations, grants or just raw muscle.

We help veterans in need with home repairs, paying bills, providing food, emergency assistance and our main mission, working with the VA to house former homeless veterans and their families. We started with our rehousing mission about 5 years ago with 4 people and our own vehicles traveling the state, picking up used furniture and redelivering it to veterans with nothing in their home. We now have, I estimate, over 100 volunteers from our lodges who pick up, assemble and deliver brand new furniture, beds and our Welcome Home Kit which contains over 50 items including microwaves and air conditioners when needed.

Most deliveries in just items are valued at over \$1800.00. Unlike most things we do in Elkdom making deliveries can be very labor intensive at times walking up 3 flights of stairs with furniture and kits. I never hear our members complain about that, they just tell the stories of veterans who for some reason have fallen on hard times and are so very appreciative of our help. We just finished a delivery to a Vietnam Veteran who had received a bronze star and a purple heart. He was living in his car, but now has a home. I am proud to say we are about to pass 2200 veterans and families helped. The first 15 days in August alone had us helping 23 veterans.

I would be remiss to not thank our great committee with so many wonderful leaders and our fantastic members who constantly step forward, giving up their time to make these deliveries to those who really need our help. You truly are the "Givers of Hope".

Every fall, lodges should be working with the schools in their jurisdiction to reestablish their Student of the Month programs - or start an additional program. Lodges can run multiple programs - for instance, one in the high school, one in middle school, and one for each elementary school. Winners can be given a certificate or a small gift to recognize their achievement.

Another school-based program is the Karen Minutella Reading Initiative. Last year was the first year that the Youth Activities Committee promoted this program. If your lodge didn't participate last school year, now is the time to start working with the schools to get approval to read Freckle Juice to the 3rd grade classes in your area. District Youth Activities chairpersons can provide your lodge with all the information needed.

Finally, we'll be running another Youth Activities fundraiser this year - tickets should be available soon. Your support will help us raise money to supplement the Batters-Up pitching machine and provide prizes to our various contest winners.

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

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# Auditing & Business Practices

he New Jersey Elks State Auditing and Business Practice Committee would like to thank the current District Vice Presidents and District Chairpersons for successfully submitting the first quarter reports. All Committees within each District of the New Jersey State Elks Association (NJSEA) are to report to the Vice President and the District Chairperson of the NJSEA, the Auditing and Business Practices Committee, a quarterly financial reconciliation of all funds, including all cash, in the custody of the District Committee. The second quarter reports will be due on December 15th.

In accordance with the Constitution of the Laws of the Order, all lodges must be in full compliance with the Grand Lodge Financial Reporting System. Compliance requires every Lodge to fully implement and maintain FRS, including use of the current Grand Lodge Chart of Accounts and the submission of the lodge budget, the Lodge Form 990 filed with IRS, a balance sheet that matches the Form 990 filed with the IRS, a starting balance for FRS as of April 1, 2021 and a timely submission and acceptance of the monthly financial reports to Adaptive. The monthly financial results are to be submitted to the FRS by the 3rd Friday of every month.

As a reminder, any lodge that fails to submit its data monthly is subject to a fine of \$100 for each month or portion thereof that the submission is late up to a maximum fine of \$500. Payment of the fine does not relieve the lodge of its duty to file the monthly submission and continued refusal to file will be considered contumacy.

The members of the committee are available to assist your lodge with any questions or concerns.
